

I. Excuses to Compromise

Daniel 1:1 (NASB)

¹ In the third year of the reign of Jehoiakim king of Judah, Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon came to Jerusalem and besieged it.

Daniel 1:2 (NASB) ² The Lord gave Jehoiakim king of Judah into his hand, along with some of the vessels of the house of God; and he brought them to the land of Shinar, to the house of his god, and he brought the vessels into the treasury of his god.

Daniel 1:3 (NASB)

³ Then the king ordered Ashpenaz, the chief of his officials, to bring in some of the sons of Israel, including some of the royal family and of the nobles,

Daniel 1:5 (NASB) ⁵ The king appointed for them a daily ration from the king's choice food and from the wine which he drank, and appointed that they should be educated three years, at the end of which they were to enter the king's personal service.

Daniel 1:8 (NASB) ⁸ But Daniel made up his mind that he would not defile himself with the king's choice food or with the wine which he drank; so he sought permission from the commander of the officials that he might not defile himself.

Daniel 1:6 (NASB)

⁶ Now among them from the sons of Judah were Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah.

7 Then the commander of the officials assigned new names to them; and to Daniel he assigned the name Belteshazzar, to Hananiah Shadrach, to Mishael Meshach and to Azariah Abed-nego.

Daniel 1:9 (NASB)

⁹ Now God granted Daniel favor and compassion in the sight of the commander of the officials,

Daniel 1:10 (NASB)

¹⁰ and the commander of the officials said to Daniel, "I am afraid of my lord the king, who has appointed your food and your drink; for why should he see your faces looking more haggard than the youths who are your own age? Then you would make me forfeit my head to the king."

Daniel 1:11 (NASB)

¹¹ But Daniel said to the overseer whom the commander of the officials had appointed over Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah,

Daniel 1:12 (NASB)

¹² "Please test your servants for ten days, and let us be given some vegetables to eat and water to drink.



Daniel 1:13 (NASB)

¹³ "Then let our appearance be observed in your presence and the appearance of the youths who are eating the king's choice food; and deal with your servants according to what you see."

Daniel 1:14 (NASB)

¹⁴ So he listened to them in this matter and tested them for ten days.

Daniel 1:15 (NASB)

¹⁵ At the end of ten days their appearance seemed better and they were fatter than all the youths who had been eating the king's choice food.

Daniel 1:16 (NASB)

¹⁶ So the overseer continued to withhold their choice food and the wine they were to drink, and kept giving them vegetables.

- 2. What were some of the excuses that Daniel could have used from the passage that was studied? Are any of those current for today?
- 3. What pressures was Daniel facing? Which of the pressures he was facing do you think you would have had trouble with?

QUESTIONS (continued)

4. Do you like your name? What does your name mean? Share with the group what the meaning of your name is. If someone changed your name to be a foul, dirty, demonic name, how would that affect you? When someone called you names back in elementary, how did you respond?

5. What examples in your life can you think of who were godly people and lived out their Biblical convictions on a consistent basis? What did you admire about them?

QUESTIONS (continued)

6. What do you believe about the Word of God? What is your response to the Word of God? How do you seek to live by obeying the Word and will of God as found in the Bible?

7. Do you believe that if you obey the Word of God and honor it as Eric Liddell did, that you will be shown favor? Was Eric Liddell shown favor? Does our obedience always turn out with a favorable outcome (see Hebrews 11:32-40)

QUESTIONS (continued)

- 8. Why does it matter that we obey God in the small things? How do those "little obediences" prepare us for big challenges and choices down the road (Luke 16:10)?
- 9. Though Daniel was disobeying the king's order to eat the food from his table, how did Daniel respond to denying that order? How does this help us to know what to do in the future when we have to disobey (1 Peter 3:15; 2 Timothy 2:24-26)?
- 10. Daniel 1 is a bit of a paradox when it comes to Daniel. On the one hand, he was obeying God. On the other hand, he was disobeying the king. How did Daniel know when to do which thing? How do you discern between submitting to the culture and society on decisions and when to obey God and go against the flow of the world?
